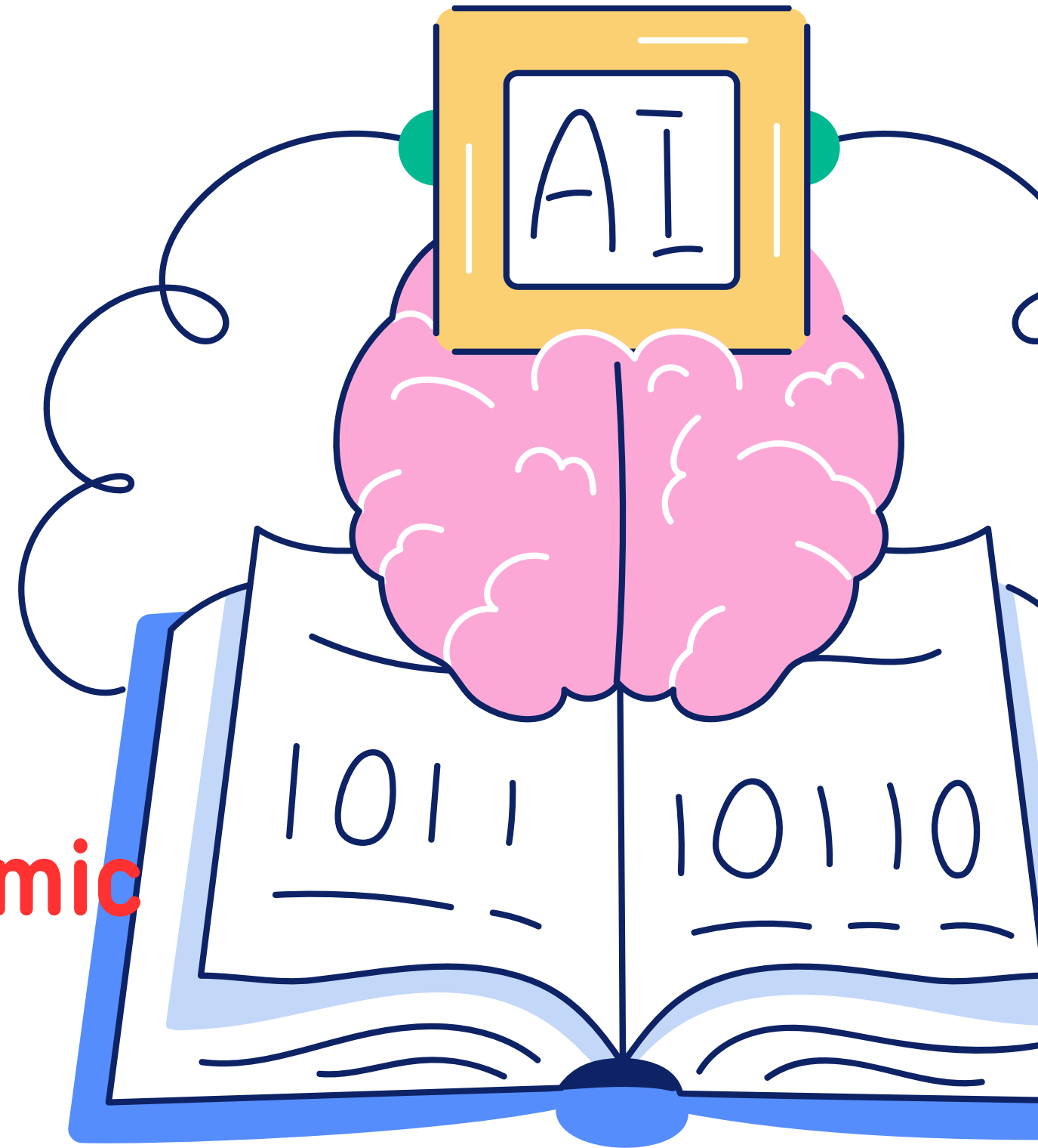
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WHY THIS TOPIC MATTERS?

Students use AI for:

- writing **essays**
- summarizing **texts**
- generating **ideas**
- translating **content**

**But: misuse may lead to legal or academic
consequences**



What Is AI-Generated Content?

created fully or partially by AI systems

Key Legal Issue

**Who is the author?
Student or AI?**



Copyright and AI

Important rules:

- copyright protects human creativity
- AI has **no** legal personality
- AI **cannot** be an author

responsibility lies with the student



Plagiarism and AI

Using AI may still be plagiarism if:

- you present AI-generated text **as your own**
- you **do not verify** the content
- you **copy** without attribution



GDPR and AI Use

AI tools may process personal data.

Risks:

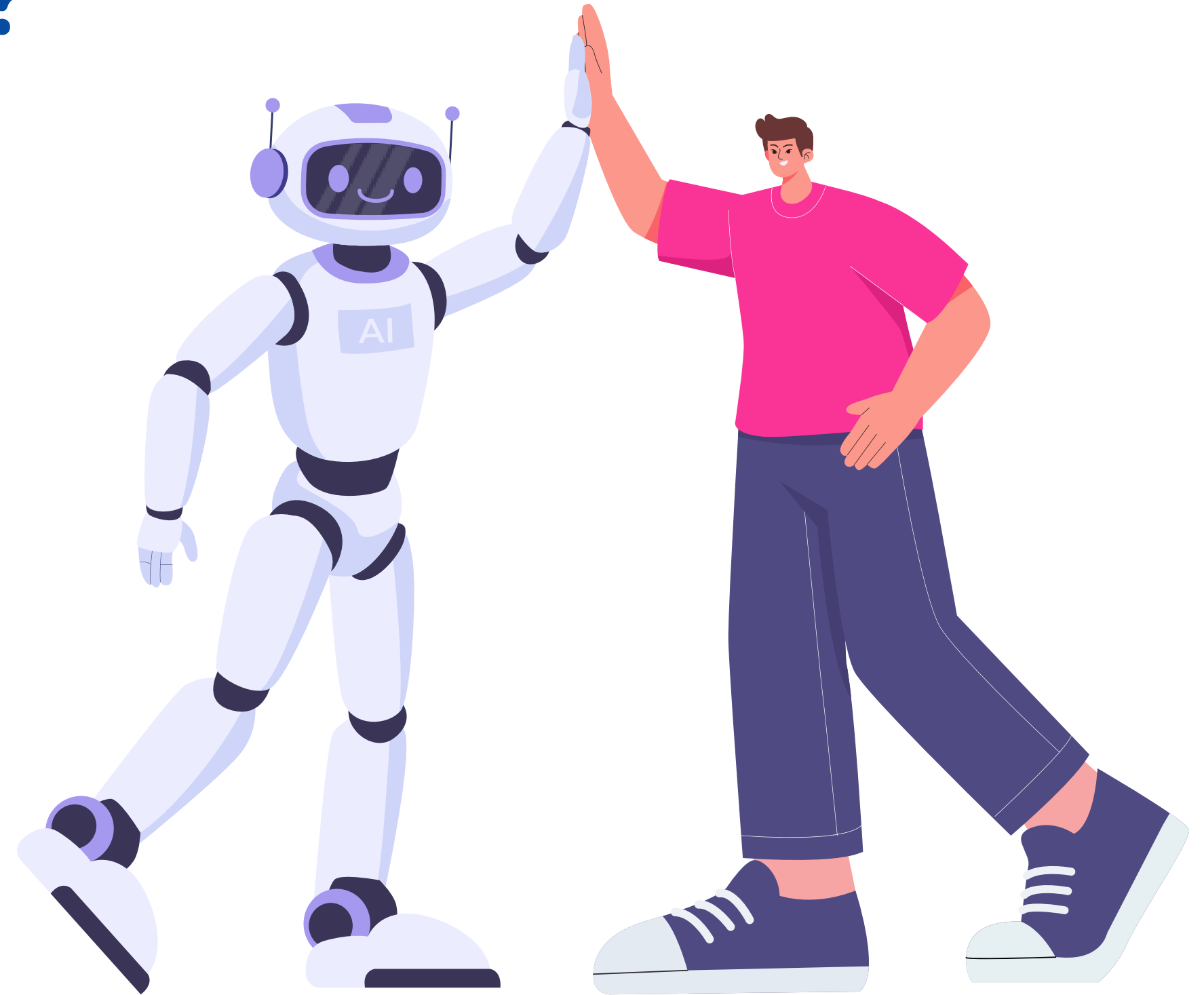
- **sharing** personal data with AI tools
- **uploading** sensitive information
- **lack of control** over data processing



When Is AI Use Acceptable?

AI can be used for:

- brainstorming ideas
- improving language
- summarizing materials
- structuring work



When Is AI Use Problematic?

AI use **becomes risky when:**

- AI generates the entire assignment
- content is not verified
- sources are not checked
- use is not disclosed (if required)



Legal Responsibility of Students

Students are responsible for:

- the **content** they submit
- **accuracy** of information
- **compliance** with academic rules
- respecting **intellectual property**



Good Practices

- always **verify** AI-generated content
- **check** sources
- use AI as a **support tool**
- follow **university rules**
- **be transparent** about AI use



Key Message

AI can **support your work**
but it cannot **replace your**
responsibility

Case Study: Disciplinary Proceedings

A student submits an AI-generated paper.

The university:

- detects unusual writing style
- checks AI detection tools
- initiates disciplinary proceedings

Possible consequences:

- failing the course
- disciplinary sanctions
- reputational damage



What Professors **Can** Detect

Professors may notice:

- sudden change in **writing style**
- **lack of** depth or critical thinking
- incorrect or **fabricated sources**
- overly generic **arguments**



What Professors **Cannot** Detect

AI detection tools:

- are **not fully reliable**
- may produce **false results**
- cannot **prove authorship**

but responsibility still remains



Legal Reality

AI tools:

- ✗ are not responsible**
- ✗ cannot be punished**
- ✗ cannot be accused**
